Have your own apples pressed and bottled. We will wash, grade, press, pasteurise and bottle into new 750 ml glass bottles.

£1.70 a bottle and 75 kg minimum press (roughly 4 sacks).

Sand blasted

On Thursday 7th September, most of us woke up to find our cars, windows and garden furniture covered in a fine layer of dust. It was amazing to realise that this dust had come all the way from the Sahara Desert in North Africa.

According to the Met Office, Saharan dust is relatively common in the UK, often happening several times a year when big dust storms in the Sahara coincide with southerly wind patterns. When the wind blows strongly over deserts, dust and sand can be whipped up high into the sky and, if the winds in the upper part of the atmosphere are blowing north, they can be carried as far as the UK. Then, for the dust to return to the ground, it needs to be washed out of the sky. Raindrops collect particles of dust on the way down, and when they land and eventually evaporate, they leave behind a layer of dust.

Although this isn't ideal for those with concerns over pollution and allergies, minerals in the dust such as phosphorus and iron, are great for plants!

Sporting successes

In recent months, Bradley resident Matt Hollins has been in training for the Ridgeway Challenge which took place on 3rd September. In this interview, Matt tells us more...

What is the Ridgeway 86? The Ridgeway Challenge is an 86-mile, fully supported continuous running event that starts at Ivinghoe Beacon near Tring and ends at Avebury Stone Circle. The route is along The Ridgeway National Trail, a 5,000-year-old prehistoric trackway through the Chiltern Hills and North Wessex Downs, with a 6328 feet ascent and a 6532 feet descent. It is also the British Trail Running Championship's Ultra Distance event.

What inspired you to enter? Compared to my previous races on coastal paths, the rolling hills of the Chilterns appealed because it would be 'easier' with a different type of scenery. The fact that the race was a National Championship made me keen to test my skills against other athletes on a nationwide basis.

How did you train for the event? Training involved an 8-week block of running ~70 miles over 6 days a week, on top of a previous 6 months of base training. The Sandstone Trail is a great training ground and is so easy to access.

What was your experience on the day? The race started at 10 am and the morning was especially tough due to the hot weather. The rolling hills of the Chilterns were an amazing sight, with huge 200 acre-plus arable fields on both sides of the Ridgeway. The scenery helped to pass the miles away. I paced myself accordingly, keeping in mind the distance involved and I was looking to finish in about 18 hrs. The evening cooled off and was pleasant to run in and I soon found myself getting into a good rhythm. However, the last 20 miles were very painful and I dug deep to push through and eventually finished in 17 hrs and 45 mins. Coming in 10th out of 104 runners was a great thrill. The satisfaction and elation of finishing is something that never becomes boring and I've already booked the first race of next year within one week of completing this one! It's always important to challenge and push yourself out of your comfort zone as much as possible. If I can do it, anyone can!

Also in local sporting news... many congratulations to Claire Snaith and Lloyd Chesters who won the mixed doubles at the annual Hollies Tennis Club Tournament. Showing great stamina, Claire then went on to win the ladies doubles (with Hannah Jones), and was runner up in the ladies' singles! Youngster Harry Hollins also had an impressive victory in the junior event. Well done to all

It has been wonderful to see our children refreshed and excited to be back at **Tushingham CE Primary School** with their usual boundless energy, smiles and enthusiasm, ready for a year full of new adventures. Over the summer, not only has our kitchen had a new oven installed, but CWAC have repaired the roofs of our mobile classrooms, and we can

reassure everyone that the school does not have any RAAC concrete.

At the start of the new term, we are pleased to welcome back Miss Smalls to Class 3 following her maternity leave, and also launch our school run wraparound care, 'The Honeypot – the home of busy bees'. of the river, while also fending off quite a lot of water from the skies! Back at school, Class 4 are staying on topic by reading Queen of the Falls and, to promote reading for pleasure to every child, there is access in class to high-quality 'recommended reads' for all year groups.
