News from St Chad's

All in good time

The phrase above is all about patience – I've heard it spoken and used it myself many times. So why do I choose to speak of it today? I've been reading a book through Lent that has truly helped me come back to my faith in a God, who holds all things in His Hands and in His Time. Believe me, it's not easy to come against a culture that believes in the opposite.

As a minister who is employed by the Church of England, I try to keep an open perspective on the Church, the world and the times we all live in and through. We are experiencing a huge shift from an industrial age to a digital age, and it's painful. In just a few decades the world has been turned upside down and it's not over yet! We are adjusting from being an island that inspired the world through its revolutionary industries and ability to produce materials that were in global demand, to a country that seems to have lost its identity completely, as we struggle like a butterfly in a chrysalis to find our way.

But the United Kingdom has suffered like this before, as indeed have so many nations and their people. Generation after generation have faced human good and human not-so-good, repeated cycles and movements that bring power and ability to either improve the plight of humankind or destroy it. Throughout history there have been key moments that have brought change, that either cause us to swell with pride at humankind's intelligence or despair in our stupidity.

“All In Good Time,” says the God who created everything...

To prove I am a priest and not a politician, I bring it all back to the heart of what I choose to believe in. We are not in control – God is! Does this mean we sit back, kick off our shoes and do nothing? Of course not. It means we come back to the one constant foundation that has always held everything together: not the Church, but God Himself. The Church, whichever denomination, are people who decide to follow the Son of God as we make our way through our lives, allowing His Spirit to help us try to understand how He is bringing His Creation to the place He knows it can be, and that includes people!

I cannot save the world, I cannot save my family, I cannot save myself, but I don't allow that truth to send me into darkness and depths of despair. For I believe and serve a God who can and does save, who has a plan and a purpose for everything and everyone, and who repeatedly encourages me by promising

The meteorologists refer to the 1st March as the beginning of Spring. We see the first signs of Spring as the bulbs push up and we see the carpet of snowdrops and crocuses that have now disappeared. I saw the first daffodils in the first week of February!

However, it is the springing forward of the clocks that enables us to enjoy the lighter evenings and, weather permitting, winter is disappearing. This year this has coincided with Easter, an event that reminds us of new life. For many, that is in the symbol of chocolate eggs and bunnies. In the Christian church it is a reminder that Jesus gave his life as a sacrifice for all our wrong doings and in doing so, enabled all of us to share with God the Father just how we are feeling, and in that process receive encouragement and inspiration to live life to the full.

At Bradley we meet, usually monthly, to sing and pray together, providing a time of worship and fellowship. Attendances are growing and, in February, the congregation appointed a new Managing Trust to serve the Chapel.

Memories of the Railway at Bradley

Part 2: The end of the line

As introduced in Part 1, the former ‘Whitchurch to Tattenhall railway’ branch line ran through Bradley from its opening in 1872. It provided a passenger service, but was used mainly for transport of goods, such as ‘steam coal’ from South Wales to Birkenhead docks (competing with coal from the Wrexham and Shrewsbury–Chester lines), as well as agricultural supplies, milk and cheese.

“The linesmen’s hut was just opposite the house. They would leave the fire in overnight so we could dry our wet clothes and sit in there if it was wet or windy; it was much warmer than our house! We used to give them the milk and water in return.”


“A neighbour’s family was kitted out in railway bibs and braces in exchange for a few jars of jam!”

However, the railways were making losses, and in 1957 the passenger service closed. It continued as a ‘freight only’ railway for oil wagons going from Stanlow Oil Refinery to the West Midlands – a route that avoided the steep gradients of Gresford Bank near Wrexham. It also served as a teaching ground for drivers of main-line diesel trains... but overall, the anticipated goods traffic for which the line had been built had not materialised, and its use was in decline.

Finally, in January 1964, the line was fully closed as part of the Beeching Axe, and the track was lifted in sections. Much of the old line and its infrastructure remains intact between Chester and Whitchurch, and you can see the former route clearly underneath Bradley Bridge (see photograph above).

“When they were taking up the line, we rode on the footplate to Grindley Brook; my Dad, Uncle Jim Chesters, me and a hound pup!”

There was much to celebrate on World Book Day, when the children dressed up as their favourite literary characters, and we had a visit from Magpie Books of Malpas so every child could exchange their free book voucher. There was also an extreme reading challenge, special assembly and lunch, bookmark competition, and scavenger hunt for each class. Then, on Red Nose Day, we all wore red and supported Comic Relief with our donations.

There was also the Science Fair at Bishop Heber, where our two entrants (with projects on mould and cress!) achieved 2nd and 3rd places, in their respective categories. That same week, Class 4 were out and about again, taking part in the Gotta Dance spectacular, onstage at Crewe Lyceum.



Back at school, Class 2 have been learning more about life in Uganda and our link school – researching online and comparing the landscape, food, lifestyles, schools and weather, with our own rural setting in Tushingham.

In the sports arena, our children enjoyed taking part in the Sportshall Athletics at Bishop Heber, and achieved a fantastic 2nd place in the recent netball tournament. We also had a visit from the Hollies Tennis Club, who spent a day giving lessons to all ages.

As the end of term approaches, we have our Easter Service at St Chad's to look forward to, as well as Class 3's special Easter play, *Three Little Trees* – rehearsals look and sound very good!

School breaks up on 27th March, and returns for summer term on 15th April.
