

6th June 2024 marks the 80th anniversary of D-Day, when Allied forces mounted the largest amphibious invasion the world has ever witnessed. In 1944, Operation Overlord saw over 5,000 ships and landing craft set down over 130,000 troops on five Normandy beaches in an action that would bring about the liberation of north-west Europe.

Good news all round. We now have secured the phone box for the defibrillator and this is being prepared for installation. The actual machine has been donated to us and the only cost will be for paediatric pads and installation. Mike from North West Ambulance is liaising with Matt Hollins to arrange training (free of charge) after installation.

Reverend Veronica Green is discussing with Church authorities the possibility of re-ordering the church so that the building can be used more as a community centre when not being used for its principal meaning as a church. I have already raised £250 towards this project from the closing fund for the Sandstone Trail Festival and I am arranging a further fund-raiser in July.

As a Parish, we are able to put names forward each year for a candidate to be awarded the OBE. If anyone feels strongly about this, please let me know and we can discuss at the next meeting on 8th July.



News from St Chad's

Where can I go?

Sometimes I just want to run away – from my responsibilities as a Parish Priest, from my worries, from myself, from the world! Sometimes I doubt all the things I've learned, all the things I want to hold steadfastly towards, and all that I see happening around me.

When Jesus was in the Garden of Gethsemane, I think he too felt the things I often feel. The longing to run away and the doubt in his heart, which brought Him to sweat drops of blood as He prayed to his Father, "Take this cup away from me," when He faced the Cross. Just knowing that I share these things with Jesus, the Son of God, gives me strength and encourages me to keep going. Before long the feelings subside and settle in the place they should.

If we were to live by our feelings alone, which I believe many of us do, then we live our lives like small boats tossed around on a mighty sea. God created us with so much more than just the ability to feel!

Author Dallas Willard says that one of our greatest characteristics as human beings is our will. "The will is the executive centre of the human self. From it the whole self is directed and organised." St Paul speaks about his desire to do his best but says quite candidly that he doesn't.

The Bible is an open book that draws humanity to a God who understands who we are, and why we are, the way we are. It is the only thing that makes sense to me in a world where little else does.

Where will your free will take you?

Choice is the way we exercise our will. We make hundreds of decisions every day, no matter if we feel as though we want to escape and run. God never forces us to do anything. Jesus is proof of that, for it was his own choice to walk to the Cross in an act of love for humankind and all creation.

At the end of my life, whenever that maybe, I would like to think that some of the choices I made, made a difference in a good way. Nothing I do will ever compare to the great act of love Jesus made, but my head, my heart, my will says, "Don't run away, stay, live each hour, each day, looking to something/ someone beyond myself and asking your will be done – not mine."

Bradley Unaffiliated Independent Congregational Chapel



Back in April, extensive flooding caused considerable problems with the stable block, when hidden and blocked drains were out of action and Bradley Lane became a brook! Our thanks to Ward Councillor Rachel Williams whose involvement ensured prompt remedial action. That enabled a small Managing Trustee group to effect 'Operation Cleanup', allowing normal

services to continue. In addition, ahead of Autumnal weather we are reviewing potential heating upgrades. Our newly authorised team of Managing Trustees is certainly making a positive impact to ongoing life at Bradley.

We are also extremely thankful that, at no cost to Bradley, members of TM&B Parish Meeting have offered to supply our copies of *The Bell* for distribution beyond the Parish, not least to some no longer able to attend regular services.

Rev'd Veronica Green led a well-attended and much valued April *Songs of Praise* service, with comfort having been improved by Chapel's replacement of seat coverings and carpets. The service on 12th May, led by Pastor Brian Faulkner, reverted to our standard second Sunday format – which will continue.

Our **Chapel Anniversary Service on 9th June at 2.30 pm** will be led by Rev'd Frank Wroe and his wife Lynda – who both visit us from Oldham. Rev'd Frank is a long-term friend of Bradley, serving as Executive Officer of the Unaffiliated Congregational Churches Charities, which grant-funded £600 of our recent improvements. Anniversary Services can help us value the work and dedication of all those who came before us. At Bradley, as with many small Chapels, local farming families gave or part-financed the cost of land, whilst helping in both funding and taking part in actual construction work.

Significant dates for Bradley were land obtained in 1891; Chapel building works in 1891 & 1905; followed in 1906–7 by the stable block. Old title deeds included family names such as Blake, Wycherley, Furber, Penlington, Roycroft, Morgan, Crump and Huxley. Alongside the farming families were drapers, a saddle-maker and, not least, builder Thomas George Huxley. Most lived in or around Bradley, with only a few in the far-flung areas of Malpas or Whitchurch or – even more intrepid – the outer reaches of Chester. Today Bradley's Ecumenical Congregationalism continues, as ever, inclusive with a welcome for all.



There has been great variety in the first half of summer term here at **Tushingham CE Primary School**, and the children amaze us every day with the quality of their work across all age groups.

At this time of year, it is wonderful to see the free learning in nursery and reception, with the children so imaginative and engrossed in their exploring. The imagination continues over in Class 3, where they have been making branching databases during computing lessons, and using freeze frames and magic microphones to depict different scenes from their class text in English. With SATs behind them, Class 4 are gearing up for their residential trip to Kingswood activity centre, and practising for their end-of-year musical, 'Pirates of the Curry Bean'!

Mr Parker has also been very busy teaching in Forest School, extending our curriculum outdoors and also planting fruit trees so that we can grow an orchard, benefiting the environment and providing shade in the summer.

Alongside this hard work, we have had some very exciting visitors.

In April, Ethan Chargois, an American basketball player with the *Cheshire Phoenix* club towered above us (see photo!) to give a hugely inspirational talk. The children were then invited to train with the team coaches and watch their play-off game at Cheshire Sport Village. Two of our children were even chosen to be mascots at the start of the game. They all had a wonderful time cheering (loudly) and pointing their foam fingers in the air!

The following week we welcomed Lord Mayor of Chester, Sheila Little, who was revisiting Tushingham having worked with some of our children many years ago. She talked and answered questions about her role, before enjoying cake and a tea party with children from each class.

On the sports' field, our football team played Shocklach away (5-3); and our newly established girls football club has also been a roaring success.

Coming up, we have an Olympic-themed STEM (**S**cience, **T**echnology, **E**ngineering, **M**aths) week, with many intriguing activities planned. Then, just before half-term we hold our annual Sports Day and Summer Fair.
